Located at the Los Cerritos Mall, the Dollar Book Fair's purpose as a company is "to make reading affordable to everyone." Another one of its goals is to protect the environment and bases its business on this premise. It recently opened its doors and is selling books at inexpensive and reasonable prices. The store not only sells and trades books, but also offers to buy CDs, DVDs, and games as well.

One of the cheapest deals is the comic books at \$1. They seem a bit old-fashioned and out-dated, but for an avid collector, it could be worth it.

In the front of the store in the display view are the New York Times Bestseller books written by authors like Janet Evanovich and Jan Karon.

In the test prep corner are the books on test practice and review material for the PSAT, SAT, AP tests, etc. Some of them are from five years ago, while the most recent was dated from last year.

There is even a foreign language section, adjacent to the test prep books, but is a very little collection with some of them being children's books. The languages vary from French, Japanese, Korean, Spanish, Vietnamese, Chinese, German, and I could not others that



identify. Textbooks range psychology, from biology, sociology, financial accounting, finite mathematics, environmental science, and statistics. I think this area would be most helpful to those taking college courses or looking for additional information about a subject. Next to this area are guides for computer-related software and programs.

Most of the shelves are disorderly, with books sticking out and not facsame direction. Only a few but 95 percent of the labeled with the used sticker, books are pre-read.

The only alphabetized materials are the pocket-sized paperback books at the rear end of the store, which makes searching for a certain book a scavenger hunt. Large cardboard boxes full of random books are located near this area. All of the other items are


of them are


Buffalo Wild Wings is known for its 14 signature sauces, making its wings and other menu items customizable creations. Enjoy boneless wings, specialty burgers and sandwiches, ribs, finger foods, wraps, salads, naked Tenders, and Buffalo New York-style chicken wings. The servers are friendly and patient towards every customer, constantly refilling your water and calming those daring enough to take the Blazin Challenge.

The Blazin Challenge is to finish 12 Blazin (its hottest and spiciest) wings under six minutes, with no water, no napkins, and no wiping your face in anyway. The prizes for partaking this daring feat are a t-shirt, a place on its wall of fame, and 12 free Blazin wings.

Going on a hunt for geocaches

Treasure hunting? Check. A game in which people of all ages can take part in? Check. Throughout the world, geocaching, the high-tech treasure hunting game, has become more popular in recent years.

The objective of geocaching is to locate outdoor hidden containers using GPS devices and then share the experiences on-


There are currently over one million geocaches worldwide, located on every continent, even in Antarctica. They may be in the most unexpected places, such as at the local park or on the side of a city street.

Geocaches are often hidden in places of historical interest or great natural beauty. This adds an additional incentive to ensure outdoor activities such as hiking, biking, or boating are enjoyable.

Each geogache is given a rating, rang-

ing from one to five.

Geocaching is similar to treasure hunting in that geochaches are often cleverly hidden in containers of all shapes and sizes, with some quite cleverly camouflaged.



Here's the catch, one is welcome to take an item from the cache as long as one leaves something of equal or greater value in the geocache, so future geocache hunters will have items to trade. Items are usually toys or trinkets of little monetary value. All caches have logsheets for participants to sign after discovering it.

In fact, some geocaches contain trackables. These are game pieces that have unique tracking codes in which geocachers can follow the item's real world travels on geocaching.com. Owners of these trackables typically set travel-related goals for them, such as to visit all fifty states.

To go geocaching, one simply needs a GPS device or GPS-enabled mobile phone, along with Internet access through a computer or mobile device. In fact, iPhone, Android, and Windows Phone 7 Geocaching applications are available to download, for \$9.99.

Geocaches can be located fairly easily, by logging on to geocaching.com. After registering for a free account, click on "Hide and Seek a Cache." Enter a postal code and click "Search." The results will show all of the geocachavailable within that area. After picking a geocache and entering onto your GPS begin to search for
